Feet drummed, party blowers resonated, there were whoops and cheers as our incomparable Master of Ceremonies, Steve Cole, introduced the children of Solihull CBG to announce the winner and present the glorious silver trophy to Michael Foreman. Michael Morpurgo sent a video from sunny Crete and reminded us all that the Award's uniqueness lies in its exclusive focus on children throughout.

Nearly 60 children were thoroughly entertained by Steve on his ukulele and with his tales of how he turned into the Incredible Hulk on a regular basis during his childhood weekends. There was a true party atmosphere throughout. Our Top Ten authors as well as Korky Paul (a past winner) and Jo Cotterill (Top 50 author) signed books, chatted to the children and shared the fun of the day.

Helping set up on the Friday was a great opportunity for us both to have a sneak peek at the publishers' stands and Lily was made to feel so welcome by everyone. The Oratory School was such an amazing backdrop for the conference and we both spent some time in the beautiful grounds dipping in to our new books. Thanks must be given to the staff who made sure our needs were met throughout the weekend.

The range of authors, illustrators and publishers was fantastic. It was great to see so much inclusivity and such a variety of speakers talking about the importance of diversity. **G.R. Gemin** spoke about tales of heritage and family being handed down through generations as well as a message of immigration and acceptance. This was a theme that was echoed many times over the course of the weekend.

Listening to so many speak about books in translation, the representation of different cultures and acceptance of variety was a poignant and timely reminder that the children's book industry has the power to influence the lives of the growing generation. With that comes the responsibility to ensure every child has the chance to find stories relevant to them in libraries, schools and book shops.

It was such a treat, as always, to be able to meet and chat with so many lovely people. As always the conference was an opportunity to catch up with old friends from other FCBG groups, as well as meet new, like-minded people.

Lily had the chance to meet some of her book glitterati and a huge highlight for her was seeing the illustrator **Martin Brown** bringing characters to life in his own well-loved style. **Caighlan Smith** also spent ages with her, writing a list of YA books she'd personally recommend to somebody just making her first steps into this area.

Wendy Bridge said, "'Bringing books and children together' was something I heard someone say when talking about the Federation and today I am able to take a huge variety of colourful, diverse and exciting books for the children at the hospice. The care team will be able to read to the children and introduce them to some really exciting adventures and show them pictures of things sadly they may never get to see in real life."





Our theme this year aimed to celebrate the power of illustrations by encouraging the sharing of picture books, the enjoyment of pictures in museums and art galleries and the writing of stories using pictures as a starting point or as part of their telling.

Each Federation book group was sent a pack of ideas, to be used as a starting point to arrange events and activities in homes, schools or communities during the month of May.

Many Federation Book Groups, as well as schools, libraries, families and community groups, organised events and festivals sharing stories on riverbanks and in nursing homes, community centres and conservatories. The Wildlife and People Trust in Alderney held a *Hungry Caterpillar* event in their amphitheatre; youngsters were involved in all sorts of activities from Salford to Ipswich to Reading. There have been drawing and writing competitions too and we are looking forward to judging the entries. We were supported by publishers, and many authors and illustrators joined in the



2016 saw Ipswich Children's Book Group celebrate 40 years of bringing children and books together. Established in 1976 by **Marjorie Taylor,** who had read about the work of the Federation of Children's Book Groups, the committee was soon organising a range of events to follow the stated aims of promoting books and reading to as wide an audience as possible, attracting a membership which included families, teachers, librarians and booksellers. This has been the make-up of the group ever since, with an increasing number of schools joining.

The events which took place during our anniversary year are also a reflection and development of those which have been organised over the previous decades, from author visits to book fairs, guizzes to book themed parties.

We were delighted that **Ruth Fitzgerald**, writer of the *Emily Sparkes* series and ICBG member, accepted our invitation to be our Anniversary Author and that we were able to adopt BLISS as our charity of the year.

The year opened with a visit by some committee members to the annual FCBG conference, where a number of specially designed congratulatory cards were signed by speakers including **John Boyne**, **Phil Earle** and **Curtis Jobling**.

The first anniversary event was the children's programme of the inaugural **BooksEast Literary Festival**, held over the weekend of 13th-15th May. Audiences were entranced and entertained by **James Campbell, Tracey Corderoy, Ruth Fitzgerald** and **Kevin Crossley-Holland**. Celebrations were marked by cake and balloons! Several open-air events followed, with book group stands and activities at the **Solstice Storytelling**

ICBG was one of the groups chosen to take part in the **Jean Russell Storytelling Project**, reaching out to vulnerable and less privileged children through the power of stories. The storyteller, **Anna Conomos** worked with children from Suffolk Young Carers enabling them to have fun listening to stories and learning how to tell stories themselves in workshops, by creating the end of a locally-based story and performing to the rest of the group.

Past and present committee members met to reminisce, pore over scrapbooks and toast the future at a party in November.



The year culminated in two author visits. On 3rd February, exactly eight years to the day, **Cathy Cassidy** was welcomed back to Ipswich. After a busy day visiting Stoke and Claydon High Schools, she entertained an appreciative audience at the Ipswich County Library talking about the importance of day dreaming and her latest book *Broken Heart Club*.

On the 8th February, 200 children from Clifford Road, Morland and St. Helen's were entertained and inspired by **Sam Gayton**, author of *Hercufleas*

and His Royal Whiskers, with an afternoon of story creating and telling, rap and book signing.

Great fun and the third event in a week!

World Book Day

was celebrated with a fascinating evening with **Garry Parsons** drawing and talking

about his books. He answered lots of questions and by special request drew a 'tiger-shark.' He also kindly gave a WBD illustration to the new Broke Hall School Library as well as an excellent portrait of Jayne their Librarian, who is past chair and honorary lifetime member of ICBG.

Most recently, **Chris Riddell** was welcomed back to Ipswich. The audience for this **'Ask the Laureate'** event had a great range of questions which he answered with his wonderful drawings supplemented by his gentle wit.

He was followed by **Linda Davies** and it was fascinating to hear her talk about the background to her novel *Longbow Girl* as well as seeing her own longbow but gladly no arrows were fired! It was also good to hear there are more stories to look forward to.

This event was also the prize-giving for the **Group's NSSM event**, a photo of which appears on page 4 of the newsletter.

We are already busy planning events for the coming months and looking forward to the next 40 years!

The next Executive meetings will be on 8th July and 14th October 2017. All meetings are held in London. Please contact Jane for further information at least two weeks in advance if you would like to attend as an observer.

One of the most important jobs for any Chair is spreading the word about the FCBG and its work. We get invited to a lot of book launches and events. On 7th June I attended the announcement of the Children's Laureate in Hull along with many people from the world of children's books. It's always lovely to be at an event like this because everyone has the same wish: to see children reading and enjoying books. It also gave me the opportunity to catch up with past Chairs Sinead and Martin Kromer and David and Jenny Blanch which is always a pleasure.

I spend a lot of time at book launches talking to publishers and authors about our work, particularly NSSM, NNFN and CBA. Last week I attended the launch of Anthony Horowitz's latest book about Alex Rider and was able to speak to some authors about coming to conference next year. I can't reveal names vet but Ros Bartlett is working on a very exciting programme. Justin Somper also told me about plans for this year's Roald Dahl Day that he hopes the book groups will want to be involved in. We'll be sending out information in UpdaTed later in the year.

I attended two very different events on the same night when I went to the launches for first time author Lorraine Gregory's book, Mold and the Poison Plot, and past CBA winner Patrick Ness's Release, I always tell everyone to make sure their publishers submit their books for testing for the CBA and remind them that it's often the only way children can discover new books, particularly now that so many libraries have lost their budgets.

By the time you are reading this I will have represented the Federation at the SLA/ YLG conference. It will be very interesting to be on the other side of the stand in the exhibition for once, I'm planning to make the most of the time speaking to the publishers about our conference next year and our plans for the 50th celebrations.
