



As 2020 marks the 40th anniversary of the Children's Book Award we are celebrating by adding an extra category of books for this year. There was a strong showing for books for teen readers in the initial stage of voting and we are very excited to be engaging with these further through the shortlist.

Any child in the UK can vote for their favourite in any of the categories - they just need to read every book in the category and rank them. 








# NATIONAL NON-FICTION NOVEMBER 2019: TRANSPORT AND TRAVEL AROUND THE WORLD


A very special thank you to Lonely Planet for their support this year, which included the banner design for the relevant Federation website pages and the fantastic prizes for the winners of the competition.

Finally, many thanks to Marc Thomas for all his hard work during 2019. We are very sorry that he has decided to step down from the role of National Non-fiction November



Andy's presentation included details of his latest book 'Paninis of Pompeii,' as well as reminding them of the ever popular 'Mr. Gum' series. A packed hall of children was entertained with funny stories, funny facts and very funny slides. Andy carried on to Peterbrook Primary where again the audience responded with hilarity.

Next day Andy entertained Dickens Heath and Yew Tree Primary where Year Six boys were crying with laughter. Solihull children will remember this visit for a long time; it certainly encouraged many reluctant readers to pick up a book, evidence of which was the long stream of children leaving their schools with a signed copy and a big smile on their faces. Andy spent a lot of time chatting and interacting with his readers which was much appreciated by everyone.

### OXFORD CHILDREN'S BOOK GROUP

#### **Bienniel Bookfest October 12th 2019**

The stellar line up of speakers deserved a larger audience but they were all very gracious and happy to contribute to what turned into a very special event. The day started with Kathy Lemaire (former SLA Chair) skilfully interviewing author Linda Newbery. Linda's latest book (published by David Fickling) is 'The Key to Flambards,' which is based upon the novels of K M Peyton. Linda shared her affection for the Flambard novels and explained how she had become friends with their author. Kathy Peyton was delighted with Linda's sequel, the heroine of which has to overcome serious challenges. However, she has inherited her Grandmother Christina's fierce determination and the book evolves very powerfully within a contemporary setting. Next, they were all treated to a lively and highly informative talk by BBC presenter and OUP author, Janina Ramirez, whose books, 'Riddle of the Runes' and 'Way of the Waves' feature a strong heroine, Alva, many other engaging characters, and a tame wolf called Fen. Everyone was captivated by Janina's passion for and knowledge of Norse lore and language and learned a great deal about the people who used to go 'a-Viking,' in times past. Irish author, Patricia Murphy, then shared her gripping work of historical fiction, Leo's War. The story's context is WW2 Rome and it features the true-life hero of the Vatican Father Hugh Flaherty, who helped to save hundreds of allied soldiers, refugees and Jews, throughout the Nazi occupation of the city.

After that the audience was able to learn more about recent developments at The Story Museum. The Museum will re-open in the Spring of 2020, after a thrillingly imaginative refurbishment. Bill Laar closed the day with a moving overview of what it means to be heroic, to demonstrate heroic behaviours and values, all of which had been embodied by the characters in the books featured during the morning. Thanks are due to all those who came to the event, to the wonderfully generous and inspirational speakers and to the hard-working committee. Only a small profit was made, but most of that will fund the group's aims to give away yet more books to schools and family centres.

#### **Tom Palmer Workshops**



### SALISBURY PLAIN CBG LAUNCH

WE CELEBRATE THE BEGINNING OF A NEW BOOK GROUP

On Saturday 21st September The Salisbury Plain Children's Book Group held its official launch event at Netheravon All Saints Primary School. There was a superb line up of illustrators and authors for a jam packed day of entertainment. The day attracted families from a wide area of the Plain with children from at least seven local schools in attendance.

The day kicked off with local picture book author and illustrator, Kristina Stephenson who held her audience, young and old, captivated for the entire morning. She treated the group to a fantastic show based on her book 'Why are there so many books about bears?' With props, puppets and dressing up, Kristina knows exactly how to bring her story to life. There was lots of audience participation with children playing the main characters of the story, including 'William Snakespeare' and 'Albert Swinestein'. Children were rewarded with cakes, balloons and special certificates from the author. The afternoon session was aimed at the older children starting with Martin Brown, illustrator of the popular Horrible Histories series - this was a hugely exciting booking for our very first event. Martin gave the children lots of advice and tips on drawing and learning how to try different things out. It was really inspiring seeing how he worked and hearing how he became an illustrator. He also treated everyone to some insight of his own incredible 'Lesser Spotted Animals' series. Animals such as The Black Footed Ferret and The Pika were brought to life by Martin as he drew and talked about the inspiration behind the books. Rounding off the event was debut novelist, Charlotte Lo, who spoke to the group about her novel 'We won an Island'. She gave everyone an insight into what it is like to be a writer of children's fiction, what gives her inspiration and her road to publication. There were lots of fantastic questions asked by children and adults alike!



It was such a warm, friendly and successful event, there were so many smiles all around the room. It was also truly delightful to see all of our wonderful authors and illustrators supporting each other. Martin and Kristina (and her lovely husband) were with them all day, both staying to see Charlotte (who was even leant Kristina's portable microphone). What an amazingly supportive community the children's book community is! The group were thrilled with the turn out at the

feedback from members and attendees, as well as the authors.

### REFLECTIONS ON BEING FCBG CHAIR

### **GOODBYE CAROUSEL**

### AND THANKS FOR THE MEMORIES

Members of the Federation were deeply saddened by the news that Carousel - the Guide to Children's Books was to cease publication after 24 years and we felt that we wanted to pay tribute to the contribution it has made over these years.

Carousel was conceived in 1995 following Anne Wood's decision to cease publication of Books for Your Children. Its development was based on the belief of its founders, David and Jenny Blanch, that every child has the right to be presented with books that are both appropriate and stimulating. Over the years, its reputation grew as a magazine that provided a source of information and independent reviews for people who have an enthusiasm for and work in the world of children's books, and especially parents and carers.

In 2016, changing circumstances for David and Jenny meant they had to step down and it looked as if Carousel would close, but David and Elaine Chant, members of the editorial team at the time, agreed to take over its running, supported by Debbie Wiggett on the finance side and Martin and Sinead Kromer who had been doing a stalwart job as reviews editors. One of the highlights for David and Elaine during their time running Carousel was seeing that first edition under their leadership and on which they had worked so hard, finally come to print. Over the past five years, the quality of the magazine went from strength to strength - an increase in pages, high quality production and design, informative reviews from a wonderful team of volunteer reviewers, and a myriad of excellent articles and author features either self-penned or as a result of interviews undertaken by the current editorial team. On a personal level it was a privilege to be invited to join the editorial board and subsequently to jointly take on the role of Reviews Editor with Debbie Wiggett and Tricia Adams, when Martin and Sinead decided it was time to step down.

There has always been a special relationship between Carousel and FCBG, something that David and Elaine have always been keen to foster. Carousel supported FCBG's 50th birthday celebrations with centre page spreads in each magazine that year, focusing on different aspects of FCBG and sponsored the successful 'Three Laureates' event in Birmingham with Julia Donaldson, Jacqueline Wilson and Chris Riddell, FCBG has supported Carousel by taking regular adverts and encouraging its members to offer the magazine as part of their membership.

In the summer of 2019, following changing circumstances, Elaine and David announced to the editorial team that they would be standing down after the autumn/winter issue. Despite everyone's concerted efforts, in seeking new partners to take on the day to day running of the magazine and role of editor in chief, no-one could be found and Elaine and David had to make the sad and difficult decision to cease publication.

Elaine and David have said they would like to take this opportunity to thank FCBG members and Executive Committee for the numerous kind messages they have received since this decision was taken and for all the partnership working and support FCBG has given Carousel over many years. I think we in the Federation, would like to say how sorry we are to lose this amazing resource, a HUGE thank you to Elaine and David for all their immense hard work in ensuring that we continued to have it for the past five years and for it having been such an informative and inspirational resource for us all. We are all hoping that at some point in the future, a new publication embodying its spirit and ethos will, like the Phoenix, rise from the ashes.


Taking over as Chair of FCBG during the organisation's 50th anniversary year was a real privilege and I thoroughly enjoyed helping to organise and deliver our three celebratory events at national level. Towards the end of 2018, I was granted a few weeks off from my day job to focus on Federation work which enabled me to visit some of the Children's Book Groups and join in with their events - most memorably in Lewes. Lincolnshire, Somerset and West Wales. I also spent a fantastic three days spreading the word about FCBG in schools and libraries on Merseyside and am delighted that we now have a new Children's Book Group up and running in that area.

It's been a very busy two years with many challenges and rewards. Along the way we've said our farewells to several experienced and highly valued National Executive Committee members, but we've also welcomed new members to the team, who are already contributing new talents and ideas, Although two book groups have closed, several have celebrated significant birthdays, and four new groups have opened. As I pass the baton on to Diane Gaunt, we are marking the 40th anniversary of The Children's Book Award and working on the development of a new website.

Although change is inevitable, even desirable, and sometimes necessary, I think that we are all united in our sadness about the closure of Carousel this year. The magazine has been a key element of what we offer to our groups and members for so many years; and how we respond to the closure will be high on the agenda of the National Executive Committee's next meeting. I'd like to take this opportunity to thank everyone who has served on the committee during my term of office - attending four meetings a year requires commitment, but only represents a fraction of the work done by committee members. I applaud the Children's Book Groups who continue to do sterling work bringing children and books together through a variety of events and activities tailored for their local communities. Never forget that everything achieved by the Federation at both local and national level is done entirely by volunteers.

It has been a great pleasure to meet and work with many organisations, publishers, authors, illustrators and individuals involved in the world of children's books, whom I whole-heartedly thank for their ongoing support. However, I remain in total awe of all the time and effort our Children's Book Groups and members devote to fulfilling the Federation's mission to encourage children and young people to read for pleasure. Here's to the next 50 years!
