Message from our Chair

What a year we've had! This time last year, as I write, we were anticipating Lockdown #1 and coming to terms with having to make the decision to cancel our conference. A year on, we are enduring a third Lockdown and we have lost another highlight of the year, having made an early decision to cancel this year's conference. Schools have been operating remotely or under special precautions for a specific group of children; libraries have been either closed or running click and collect only services; book groups have been unable to meet and have struggled with their mission of bringing children and books together. It has undoubtedly been a difficult time for the members of the Federation, and we are grateful for the good health enjoyed by most. Our thoughts are with those members who have been unwell.

As the saying goes, when the going got tough, the tough got going so there have been many positives, too. The Executive committee immediately moved to virtual meetings, initially once a fortnight and now once a month, which has enabled us to work more closely than ever before. A joyful Children's Book Award took place and, despite missing the face-to-face companionship of like-minded bibliophiles, the ceremony reached more people than ever before. National Share-a-Story Month and National Non-Fiction November went ahead and proved a great draw with our Twitter and Facebook followers. Publishers and authors showed great generosity in sharing access to new titles in a variety of virtual ways, and we developed a supplement to UpdaTED which keeps members informed of such book news. Despite an inevitable lack of Group news, our newsletter was still produced and sent out electronically. Behind the scenes, we have developed new policies and protocols aimed at more effective running of the Federation to serve its members.

We are looking forward. We are actively seeking funding opportunities to enable us to continue and to develop our initiatives; the Children's Book Award will be run over a two-year period this time, which will enable books published during the pandemic to feature equally with those to be published over the coming year. National Share-a-Story Month will soon be with us and will be a real treasure. And the planning for conference 2022 is well under way. There are many reasons to believe that tomorrow will be a good day!

I hope you will be able to join us on 17th April for the Annual General Meeting, which will take place virtually. We would also love your company for the guiz which takes place later that evening. We wish you all good health and fortitude to cope with the social demands of living through a pandemic and cannot tell you how much we are looking forward to seeing you in the flesh once more. In the meantime, please keep in touch with us and let us know what more we can do to support you.



Every year, schools across the country take part in NNFN. Here is a focus on the work carried out in Grewelthorpe Primary School in North Yorkshire.

NNFN in Grewelthorpe C of E Primary School

Having chosen to study rainforests and endangered and extinct animals, our aim was to find out the facts and encourage people to adapt their behaviour to make for a better world.

As part of NNFN, we examined many non-fiction texts and websites to collect information concerning deforestation and the problems it is causing. The children researched individual animals on the WWF website and chose one to sponsor by producing persuasive PowerPoints to show to the school via a zoom assembly and then held a vote as to which to sponsor.

In addition, we looked at images of deforestation scenes and wrote poems based upon the animal's perspectives. We also produced some water colour forest scenes and printed our poems onto tracing paper which we attached to the water colour.

Prizes are still being offered and we are so thrilled with the support from publishers!



Emma O'Brien, Librarian at Arden Academy, Solihull and a keen tester for the Children's Book Award writes:

Arden has started their first Virtual Book Club and although the students cannot access the CBA books at the moment, they are meeting weekly to discuss books via Google Classroom.

There is a theme each week e.g. Myths & Legends, and chat for half an hour on discussion topics related to that theme. It's a great way for students to stay connected and promote a love of reading during these times. It's also helpful to pop bubble barriers! Because it is digital, every year group can join so there are Year 7s talking to 6th formers about their favourite books. Emma says it's heartwarming to see and highly recommends every librarian create a virtual book club if they are able to do so. She is hoping that after half term the students can access the library once more and get back to reading and voting on the Children's Book Award.






HERTS CHILDREN'S BOOK GROUP

Janet Syme, Librarian at Simon Balle All-through School, Hertford writes:

For ten years the highlight of the autumn term for their Library has always been the annual Book Festival with half a dozen authors, poets and illustrators visiting as well as the Travelling Bookshop. In addition to the main Library for Years 7-13 they now have a second Larch Library serving their new Primary phase. They became the second All-through School in Hertfordshire, opening in September 2015 with their first two Reception classes in a modern, purpose built Primary building. (It will take until the intake in September 2021 for the new Larch Centre to fill.)

Whilst this year was a slimmed down week of Festival events, they managed to organise two live author sessions online with popular children's writer Emma Carroll. She spoke virtually with Years 4 and 5 classes first and students were very excited as *Letters from the Lighthouse* is in the literary canon for the next academic year. Also, Year 4 students are studying Egypt this year, so Emma talking about *Secrets of a Sun King* was particularly relevant. During Lockdown#3 they strongly encouraged their Year 7 students (whom she also spoke with) to watch Emma's new series of Creative Writing sessions on Instagram Live @emmacarroll2603 Tuesdays and Thursdays 10.00-10.30am until half term. These fascinating and accessible events have also been recorded.



For their 2020 Autumn Festival, Fiona Bentley, a book loving contact of theirs, who has started bookbinding as a hobby, made a special video for students. This was shown to small groups of enthusiastic Secondary students at lunchtime in the main library and to Year 5 classes during an assembly.

Fiona actually rebound two of their classics titles beautifully and she filmed the process, sending samples to school of the materials used. Their Art Department is also going to use the film when they look at bookbinding in one of their modules.
