Taking Part in the CBA Testing 2020

Herts CBG is one of the CBA Testing Groups and we have always enjoyed taking part in the longlist and shortlist testing for the Children's Book Award.

Each year, schools in Hertfordshire take it in turns to host a CBA Discussion Morning. We were particularly excited that this year, for the special 40th Anniversary of the awards, there would be four categories to celebrate. So we decided to run three discussion mornings, one each for Cat 2, 3 and 4 hosted by Manor Lodge School, The Marlborough Science Academy and Ridgeway Academy. Sadly Covid-19 made that impossible, with students being sent home before many of them had a chance to read the shortlisted books.

We were delighted when the Federation announced that the CBA Ceremony would go ahead as a virtual event. At least we could watch the ceremony even if we couldn't be there in person as in previous years. Sarah Stuffins the CBA Coordinator invited testing groups to film our children and young people reviewing the shortlisted books. Ridgeway Academy students Megan and Jamie, along with The Marlborough Science Academy students Stephen, Chloe, Katie and Jaiden rose to the challenge and agreed to be filmed talking about the shortlisted titles. Stephen's comments were typical of the students' experiences: "The feeling of being recorded was nerve-racking at first since it was the first time doing anything like this, but as I got into it the more comfortable it became talking about books I enjoy. It was an opportunity I am glad I took as books are my passion and I would love to do it again." Stephen aged 17.

My colleague Sharon Nixon LRC Manager at The Marlborough Science Academy said: "It was certainly a challenge this year from getting the shortlisted books to the students to read, to collecting their votes and then trying to get some video reviews. I was delighted that four of our Herts CBG students were included in the final films and I really enjoyed the virtual ceremony.

I also enjoyed watching the filmed book reviews and author interviews in the run-up to the Awards Ceremony on 10th October. It really added to the anticipation and enjoyment of the final event. I felt that the Federation and the CBA team really pulled out all the stops to make this 40th Anniversary Children's Book Awards 2020 a very special event indeed. Well done and compliments all round, especially to all the young people involved, our fabulous presenters and the brilliant film crew who put it all together.

National Non-Fiction November 2020

The Planet We Share

Ten years ago, Adam Lancaster, who was Chair of the Federation at the time, launched National Non-Fiction Day, in association with Scholastic. It soon became clear that one day wasn't enough and four years later, the celebration of all things factual was developed into a whole month and renamed National Non-Fiction November. Scholastic still contributes to our programme, but over the years we have worked closely with other publishers who have sponsored the competitions including Hachette, Lonely Planet Kids and Walker Books who are supporting this year's competition for KS1 children alongside Troika Books who are supporting the poetry writing competition for KS2 and 3 students. You will find the full details on our website.

Every year we try to involve and represent as many publishers of non-fiction as we can through our programme of blogs, book reviews and resources. These range from well-established publishers like Usborne or the Quarto Group with its multiple imprints, to smaller up and coming publishers like UCLAN and Five Quills. Although the focus is on information books, fiction is also included. Picture books, poetry and novels often provide a good way in to learning about or initiating a discussion about the chosen theme. Look out for blogs by Nicola Davies, M G Leonard and Steve Cole whose recent books explore conservation, plastic pollution and environmental issues.

We realise that this is a challenging year for groups in terms of organising events, but we hope that you are still able to promote and make use of the ideas, resources and book list on the website and that you can also encourage your members to enter the competitions.

It's equally challenging for public and school librarians. However, the secondary school where I work is planning to mark the month in a variety of ways:

- We will be inviting students in Y7, 8 and 9 to enter the poetry writing competition, which we will launch during our regular library lessons currently being delivered to year group bubbles in their classrooms;
- the Head of English is organising a NNFN assembly involving members of staff from different departments, which will be filmed and delivered virtually to the whole school;
- we have organised a whole school Drop Everything and Read (DEAR) session, to be held during a PSHE lesson, using *i newspapers* supplied free of charge by the paper (see the resources list on the FCBG website for more information);
- the English Department is gifting Question Everything (b small) to all the Y8
 pupils to compliment the English scheme of work which covers fake news
 and support our Approaches to Learning course;
- we will be creating posters of individual non-fiction titles recommended by staff, which will be displayed on classroom doors (downloadable bookmarks, bunting and posters are still available from 2019 on the FCBG website);
- the library team will be creating colourful posters showing a range of different information books, including books on The Planet We Share theme, which we'll display around the school;
- the library will be running non-fiction quizzes for our book clubs, delivered in year group bubbles.

What we do has built up over the years. But it proves that even with the impact of COVID-19 it is still possible to shine the spotlight on non-fiction during November 2020.
