The Explorer also won the Books for Younger Readers category. Katherine Rundell and Hannah Horn will each receive a silver acorn and be able to keep the silver oak tree trophy for the coming year.

The category winners received an engraved glass book as their prize. The other winners were:

Books for Younger Children category: I Dare You written and illustrated by Reece Wykes (Andersen)

Books for Older Readers category: I Have No Secrets written by Penny Joelson (Electric Monkey)

Congratulations to all our winners and all the other shortlisted titles. However, it can be said that everyone was a winner really as they all received a wonderful personalised portfolio of contributions from the children who voted for them.

The Union Jack Club in London played host to the ceremony again. It was attended by over a hundred children and adults - a mixture of representatives from our local groups, the shortlisted authors and representatives from their publishers, some previous winners, members of our national Executive and last but by no means least our amazing MC, Steve Cole, who entertained everyone with his ukulele and

some very funny jokes about fruit.

Unfortunately, neither Katherine nor Hannah were able to attend, but Katherine sent a lovely video message

thanking everyone for voting, adding, "I can't say how grateful I am. It's so exciting!"

The Federation of Children's Book Groups is delighted to announce a sponsorship deal with **BookLife Publishing** for the Children's Book Award for 2018.

Since the withdrawal of sponsorship by the equity partners of The Book People in 2015, the award has been funded entirely by the Federation. Prudent management of costs, coupled with sponsorship for rail travel from the Rail Delivery Group for 2017, has meant that the award has continued to run with great success, but a financial commitment from non-fiction publishers and book distributor, BookLife, based in Kings Lynn, means that Sarah Stuffins, Children's Book Award Co-ordinator and Julia Miller, Federation Sponsorship Manager, can work with the BookLife management team to improve our web site, our publicity and our award for schools and families not only within the Federation but also beyond.

BookLife has already shown its commitment to the award and to the Federation by donating £1,000 worth of books to Jo Williams of Aldbourne CBG, who won our raffle at conference. It has also given £500 worth of books to our new professional member, the Bath Children's Literature Festival, which is working closely with its partner schools to involve them in the Top Ten voting for 2018.

Our publishers, who support the Children's Book Award by sending copies of each book to our twelve Tester groups, are also financially supporting the Top Ten. Coupled with contributions from the tester groups and the BookLife sponsorship, the Children's Book Award will be in a healthy position as we start our countdown to its 40th anniversary in 2020!

GOLDEN NATIONAL NON-FICTION NOVEMBER 2018

Food and Festivals Around the World

The theme we have chosen for National Non-Fiction November (NNFN) for this special 50th Anniversary Year is 'Food and Festivals Around the World.' The global perspective and the focus on food links directly with the theme for National Share a Story Month, which recently celebrated a world of stories, looking at food in stories and exploring the basic 'ingredients' required for a good story. Stories feed our imagination and our need for telling and listening to stories is a basic element of being human, regardless of where we come from or live, and contributes to our sense of belonging and well-being.

Food is also a necessary requirement: for keeping healthy, and in the case of children, for growing and developing. It is also associated with celebrations and festivals around the world. Young people enjoy having the opportunity to grow their own food and to learn how to prepare food and cook for themselves, and we hope that one of the outcomes of NNFN will be the creation of some fabulous recipe books to share. We also hope that the theme will provide an opportunity for children to explore the everyday food enjoyed at home and by different cultures, in addition to finding out about the special foods associated with the festivals of the major religions.

It is always the aim of NNFN to highlight some of the best non-fiction titles currently available and celebrate the enjoyment of reading information for personal interest and pleasure. We are looking forward to discovering books about healthy eating, growing, making and preparing food and the food associated with different cultures and religions which will feed our young readers' natural appetite for knowledge!

1968-2018 The History of the Federation of Children's Book Groups




Karen Hellewell, Louise Stothard and Julia Miller explain how the book of our history came to be written.

The process of compiling all the information for the History Project was lengthy and time-consuming. There were certainly times when it felt like wading in glue, but we were constantly inspired by the passion of everyone who had gone before us and who shared our mission of bringing children and books together.

Quite often each of our initiatives began in a similar way, stemming from the passion and determination communicated by one person to bring more children and books together and most started in a small way. NSSM for example, began as National (thinking big already) Tell A Story Week. After all, we can all tell a story, whether parent, grandparent or godparent. This initiative rapidly widened with book group support, launches, fund raising and sponsorship to become truly national in scope. However, the ephemera which turned up in unlikely places was fascinating. Read the recent blog about the history of NSSM on our web site to learn more.

The display boards

Anne Wood's generous sponsorship through the Ragdoll Foundation of the History Project included publicity and while we have displays at Conference for delegates it was decided that a set of display boards would be created to enable Groups and Federation delegates at other Conferences to spread the word. We wanted to cover the initiatives which form the backbone of the FCBG but which would be easy to access. We decided on six boards: bright, colourful and informative with the tree below at the centre.



Just as children grow, so the growth of the tree reflected the burgeoning of the Federation and this formed the organising principle and structure of the book. Its advantage was it kept a chronological focus while allowing plenty of space for expanding to mention other off shoots. There could have been a whole book on the creation of booklists and anthologies for example.



So how did we end up with this?

This diagram evolved from the apple tree logo designed by Louise Comfort for the Conference in Grantham in 2012. We all liked the metaphor of a tree growing and Louise Stothard initially drew a tree with branches.

This was further refined by Jon Kiefert who designs for Ragdoll Productions and whose time

and insight was lent to us by Anne Wood. We wanted the tree to continue past the top of the book to show the continuance of the FCBG, stressing this was the first 50 years and by including the date against a coloured background, we had a style that we could echo in each of the display boards by using the same colour as a background colour for that particular subject board.



We worked with Jon and Anne to ensure that the tree diagram had a balance of years and initiatives, that it included every major national initiative that is still in existence, and that it highlighted other major Federation events and projects over the 50 years.

There were all the ingredients needed for a birthday party: gold and silver balloons; bunting; crafts; dressing up opportunities in the Museum's talking throne room; fairy fizz to drink; and crisps, popcorn and cake! Most of the children (and grown-ups) made their own gold and silver crowns to wear, and decorated golden treasure chests with jewels, because, I am sure we would all agree, a great book is like a valuable, muchloved and often-hoarded treasure!

The OCBG was delighted to welcome, as a special guest, former headteacher and author **Neil Griffiths** who enthralled us with his story about Itchy Bear. Neil is the original inventor of Storysacks, which have figured large in our group over the last two years, because we have already

We were all mesmerised by the golden-themed King Midas story, written and read by award-winning author of over 175 children's books, and long-time member of OCBG, **Geraldine McCaughrean**. TOP TIPS FROM AROUND THE GROUPS SHARED AT CONFERENCE 2018!

VENUES:

Try contacting the Education officer at your local National Trust property. They are keen to include children's events in their programme and will publicise online. (Lincs have an event happening at Belton House during October half term). Use museums and art galleries in your area for storytelling sessions and author/book events. Birmingham, Reading, Harrogate and Oxford have done this successfully.

EVENTS:

Book swaps work well in schools. Collect the books in beforehand and maybe issue 50p book tokens to help with purchases. Lewes, South Bucks and Birmingham report these are relatively easy, no cost events. Picnics with Fed Ted could be popular, particularly with a royal theme!

IDEAS:

Simple story sacks can be made for children in hospital using cushion covers to store the cleanable items alongside the book. These were gratefully received from the Oxford group at their local children's ward.

Each undertaking has proved to be a great way to keep up with current children's publishing; while being a member of Reading Children's Book Group and working in a secondary school has helped to ensure I keep in touch with what

We can't assume, however, that the parents and teachers we encounter are all as well-informed about the great books available for their children, just because of the wider access to information afforded by new technologies. As members of FCBG, we are all very well-positioned to be able to make a significant contribution to bringing children and books together.

CONFERENC


